## 17. Course Content Outline:

Texts or Major Resources:

- Music notation software: Finale 2012.
- Adobe acrobat reader
- High speed internet connection recommended
- Webcam/mic

Course Content and Schedule:

The supplemental lecture/demonstration component of the course is offered via archived video available from the Modules tab of Canvas, and viewable with Panopto. A high speed internet connection is recommended and webcam/microphone are needed for potential video posts and interaction.

Class topics will adhere to the following schedule:

- Week 1 Score setup: setup wizard (templates, custom), the score manager, document/program options, basic palettes, toolbars
- Week 2 Dynamic expression and articulations, score layout techniques

- Week 3 Note entry/basic tools/techniques: simple/speedy entry, hyperscribe, layers, context menus (2012), selection tool (copy filter from edit menu, also selecting regions from edit menu), adding/deleting measure stacks (also clearing measures)

- Week 4 Additional tools: key signature tool, time signature tool (basic only), clef tool, measure tool, tuplet tool, text tool Assignment 3 due
- Week 5 Additional tools continued: repeat tool, chord tool, ossia tool, lyric tool, percent tool

# 18. Assignments / Projects:

Assignments (12  $\times$  50 pts. each): Assignments will consist of entry of music into Finale, using the techniques discussed in class.

Final project (250 pts.): The final project will be an entry project for a large ensemble of mixed instrumentation, must include formatted, print-ready parts and full playback functionality. The final project will take the place of the final exam for this course.

Class Presentation (150 pts.): The class presentation should be 30 minutes in length and should include PowerPoint slides and audio/video resources (with links if applicable). A study handout should be prepared and distributed to the class.

Although your participation in discussion will not be graded, students who are actively engaged in class discussion generally achieve better results on assignments and projects.

#### Attendance/Absences:

- Attendance is mandatory and will be taken at the beginning of each class.
- Any student who joins the class more than five minutes late will be marked tardy. Three unexcused tardies will result in a final grade reduction of 1 letter.
- You are allowed 1 unexcused absence. Additional unexcused absences will result in a final grade reduction of 1 letter for each absence.

The final project will take the place of the final exam.

## 20. Justification for Graduate Credit:

Prerequisite for the level of skills and expertise required in the course would be a professional baccalaureate degree in music as defined by the National Association of Schools of Music standards for graduate study. The course provides advanced study of the Finale notation program as related to the music education classroom. It builds on undergraduate knowledge of music notation, style, and formal analysis. Graduate students will incorporate advanced compositional techniques with their experience as classroom teachers in a project for large ensemble of mixed instrumentation. The project requires the synthesis of graduate level music theory and the knowledge gained from the various complex Finale notation topics throughout the course. The instructor holds graduate faculty status.
